At a Glance

Medellín, the “City of Eternal Spring,” is a hub for digital nomads and travelers. Known for its innovative transit, vibrant street art, and welcoming *Paisa* culture, it offers a balance of high-energy nightlife and serene mountain landscapes.

First 48 Hours

- **Arrival:** Take an official airport bus (~\$5) or taxi (~\$20–30) from MDE Airport.
- **Settle In:** Check into your “landing pad” (Hotel/Airbnb) in El Poblado or Laureles.
- **Connect:** Get a local SIM card and download **Uber**, **DiDi**, or **InDriver**.
- **Explore:** Take a walk through your neighborhood and find a local *fonda* for your first *Menú del Día*.

Getting Around

- **Metro System:** Integrated trains, Metroplus (BRT), and Metrocable (gondolas). Fare: ~\$0.70.
- **Ride-Hailing:** Use Uber, DiDi, or InDriver for transparent pricing and safety.
- **Terminals:** *Terminal del Norte* (for Guatapé/Bogotá) and *Terminal del Sur* (for Jardín).

- **Pro Tip:** Do not rent a car; traffic is heavy and the Metro/Apps are sufficient.

Eat This

- **Must-Tries:** Bandeja Paisa (regional platter), Arepas (corn cakes), Mondongo (tripe soup), and world-class Colombian Coffee (*tinto*).
- **Budget Strategy:** Look for *Menú del Día* (soup, main, juice) at local *fondas* (\$3–\$7).
- **Top Spots:**
 - *Traditional:* Mondongos, El Pilon Guarceno.
 - *Contemporary:* Oci Medellín, Malanga del Trópico.
 - *International:* Fenicia (Middle Eastern).

Day Trips

- **Guatapé & Piedra del Peñol:** Climb the 740-step rock and visit the colorful town.
- **Parque Arvi:** Highland nature reserve accessed via Metrocable.
- **Santa Fe de Antioquia:** Colonial town with preserved Spanish architecture.
- **Jardín:** Picturesque coffee-growing village in the mountains.

Safety & Etiquette

- **“No dar papaya”:** Don’t flash wealth or leave valuables unattended.
- **Neighborhoods:** El Poblado/Laureles are safe; avoid walking in *El Centro* after dark.
- **Transport:** Avoid hailing random street taxis; use apps.
- **Emergency:** Dial **123** for general emergencies (Police/Ambulance).
